This was a gap in our MUMP tests.

We have looked at changing fractions and tenths to decimals. We do this by partitioning the number into the whole and the tenth.

EG-

2 2/10 = 2.2 (There are 2 wholes and 2 parts of a whole)

2/10 = 0.2 (There are no wholes and 2 parts of a whole)

Remember that 10 tenths make a whole! Use this number line to help you!



1. Finding the area of simple shapes -

Example: What is the area of this rectangle?



The formula is:

Area =
$$w \times h$$

 $w = width$
 $h = height$

The width is 5, and the height is 3, so we know $\mathbf{w} = \mathbf{5}$ and $\mathbf{h} = \mathbf{3}$:

Area =
$$5 \times 3 = 15$$




